Bats in the Belfry? An interesting article and request from Jane MacLeod

EXCITING DISCOVERY IN FILKINS

I have an open pitched porch outside my front door where bats have been roosting, breeding and hibernating for many years. I rarely see them except a quick sighting as they fly around at dusk.

Sadly on 15th December I found two bats on the paving inside the porch. Temperatures had dropped to minus 7 that night, but I brought them inside in the hope that they might just have dropped from the roost in a torpid state. They were cold to touch but limbs and wings were quite pliable. Unfortunately there were no signs of recovery and as rigor mortis set in it became clear they were both dead.

I believed that all the bats in the roost were common Pipistrelles but when I put photos and information up on my Wildlife Group an ecologist replied that one of the bats was a Lesser Horseshoe Bat and the other a Myotis - either a Natterers or Bechsteins. She indicated how lucky I was, as they are not commonplace and to report my findings to my local Bat Group - www.oxfordshirebats.org



After contacting them I received the following reply:



"Obviously it's rather sad that information comes through as a consequence of the demise of the bats however to have evidence of the presence of lesser horseshoes is particularly exciting. We are trying to build a picture of where lesser horseshoes are in Oxfordshire and it is very valuable to have confirmation from Filkins. In the past we have had some intriguing reports from along the A420 corridor (Faringdon eastwards) of cat caught bats which sounded very like horseshoes, however no photos were taken or bodies retained so we couldn't be sure. We think the Oxfordshire stronghold for the species as being the Charlbury/Chipping Norton area, where they have some hibernation sites but just lack the information as to where else they may be, so your record is very valuable.

It would be really interesting to find out more about the bats using your property and we wondered if you would be happy for a small number of group members to visit to perhaps carry out an emergence survey in the spring/summer (which involves just watching, counting, ascertain the species). If feasible we might be able to do some more survey work to find out where else in Filkins they may be, flight lines and foraging areas"

I will be thrilled and fascinated to welcome this group but would also like to provide them with further information of other possible bat roosting sites around our villages. If anyone knows of any bat roostings - maybe in the churches, barns or outbuildings and would be willing to let me have details to pass on I would be most grateful. Maybe we have more of these rarer Lesser Horseshoe Bats than we are aware of. If you happen to come across any dead bats perhaps you could take a photograph (facial features, approx. size) and/or collect them (with gloves) or contact me with location and I will collect them

THE PLATINUM GARDEN PROJECT

An Update, Vision and a Request....

In last month's newsletter we shared progress on the ground clearing activities in our Platinum Jubilee Garden. If you have wandered down to the allotments or peered over the wall from the playground, you will see work is still ongoing and in its early stages, with a large tree stump unearthed and ready to be ground down so that the land can be further levelled and prepared for landscaping. It's a messy time – especially in all the rain!

But what is the vision? the design below is the plan – some lines may be curvier than shown (my IT skills fell short here!); some elements may need to be a second phase; we are looking at options to reduce concrete and replace with hoggin; planting specifics are not yet addressed - but hopefully you get the broad idea. The brief was to keep it simple, easy as possible to maintain (as we will need volunteers apart from the mowing) and able to cope with drier summers. We need access to a picnic area, seating and improved access to the allotments. We think it meets the brief – would you agree? Hopefully it will be a lovely place to stop, sit and chat with friends. A world away from how it looks today!

We already have some funding available, but we are also applying to the NGS for more (we need more!) and should hear back in March. We also hope to receive some native hedging plants from the late "Queen's Jubilee Canopy" initiative.

Whilst we wait for news on funding, we have sufficient money in the pot to press on with some hard landscaping at least, with the aim to get the area looking neat as soon as possible ready for Spring.



Strawberry Mascarpone & Lemon Curd Tart

This is a very easy Waitrose recipe which I am sharing this month as it can be adapted to make the perfect Valentine's Day dessert. Just halve the ingredients and either buy or make two single pastry cases. If you are brave (& have moulds) you could make them heart shaped, if not, just arrange the strawberries on top in the shape of a heart – even easier if you have a pastry cutter to use as a template! Otherwise just make as below and enjoy!

The recipe as you can see uses a bought pastry case but it is nice to make your own just google a recipe for sweet pastry and bake the tart blind (prick pastry, cover with baking paper and weight down with baking beans or some dried beans) cook as per recipe instructions, usually an oven at 200 degrees C for about 15 mins then remove paper and beans and bake for another 15 mins, then leave to cool before filling.



Ingredients

125g mascarpone
125g greek yoghurt
175g lemon curd
1 lemon, zested
1 sweet pastry case (215g) (bought or made)
400g strawberries, sliced.
Icing sugar to dust.

Method

Beat together the mascarpone and yoghurt in a bowl until smooth. Beat in the lemon curd and most of the lemon zest until combined. Use mixture to fill the pastry case(s), then arrange the strawberries on top and chill for 20 minutes. Dust with icing sugar and scatter over remaining lemon zest.
