Will I ever get over the wonder of everything bursting forth in the borders? I hope not!

I am busy putting in plant supports and tying things in to help them along and keep them steady. Although this year it has been touch and go for some shrubs and perennials – I know fellow Gardening Club members have been watching nervously to check losses due to those intense frosts in early winter. Even some of our hardy regulars have taken a hit. Many of us have gaps to fill in our beds and borders as a result.

In the Gardening Club, we have had the pleasure of welcoming some new members in recent weeks and are busy pulling together the first of our trips for this year – Westwell Garden and Kingham Lodge are first up for May and then Iford Manor on 1st June.

This time of year is incredibly busy in the garden, as the soil warms, and we start to think ahead to summer evenings sitting out and enjoying the fruits of our labours surrounded by summer bedding....

OK, maybe I am jumping ahead. Hard work to be done first, so here are some gardening tips for May (and beware late frosts until the end of the month!).

- Check and loosen any tree ties that are digging into bark, or about to, as the trunk girth expands. A small task easy to overlook.
- ➤ Getting out the pruners? do check for nesting birds in large shrubs, hedges and trees before you proceed. You can come back to prune after August if needs be.
- ➤ Tie in climbing and rambling roses as near horizontal as possible. This will restrict sap flow causing more side shoots to grow along the length of the stem and therefore more flowers to be produced.
- > Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other spring-flowering bulbs.
- ➤ Join in No-Mow May encourage wildflowers in your lawn by stopping mowing early May through to at least June. This allows wild plants already in your lawn to grow up and flower, adding colour and attracting pollinating insects and other wildlife. Leave your whole lawn, mow a path, or just leave a section.

When putting the displays together I found in George's telegraph postal pouch instructions for 'Cleaning of Telephone Kiosks, Etc'. I thought this was quite pertinent as the Parish Council are due to refurbish our lovely kiosk. Here are a few of the instructions:-

If a caller is using a box when the cleaner arrives the caller must not be disturbed. Members of the public must always be treated with courtesy and respect.

A Special report should be made to the exchange if it is ascertained that the kiosk has been used by a person suffering from an infectious disease, and a notice 'Out of Order' should be placed on the outside of the door.

The full instructions for the cleaner can be viewed at the museum. We open the first and third Sunday of the month, 2.00 to 5.00pm and we would love to greet you.

- Councillor Richard Howe as Chairman reminded the Council of the change in date for the Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council meeting to 15 May. This is due to elections and extra bank holidays.
- Work continues in the Platinum Garden, the path has now been laid and the surrounds built around the first beds. The next step will be levelling the area for laying the hardcore and hoggin areas. The Committee will be at the garden on 23 April 2-6pm for gardens open and 29 April 10am for the swimming pool and playground opening. Please let them know if you are available to help in any way.
- Playground- official opening on 29 April 10am please come along fun for the children!
- Kick about field- new fence to be erected this month and the power cable to be extended





FILKINS BOWLS CLUB

Village Club Day "Let's Roll" on Sunday 25th June 2023

Bowling has a reputation as being rather fuddy duddy and for the elderly but far from it. It is actually fun, friendly and gentle exercise. Filkins is fortunate to have had a bowling green since 1936 but like many village clubs and organisations membership has risen and fallen over the years. Currently there are about 16 playing members, not sufficient for participating in leagues, but we play other clubs in Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire in 'friendlies' at home and away.

It would be a great shame if such a long standing club folded for lack of support so to this end we are inviting other village clubs and organisations AND any individuals to enter our fun "Let's Roll" Day

We assume most entrants will not be experienced bowlers which is all to the good.

Two teams of two will play each other over 2 sets of 3 ends (an 'end' is basically bowling from one end of the green to the other), with each player using three bowls and taking turns to deliver their bowls nearest to the 'jack.' Community Lunch Club - The Story

It was one evening in 2016 about this time of year when we and a couple of friends were putting the world to rights over supper and with just a glass or two of wine. Being as we are, the four of us had concluded in our musings that there were large groups of people who were significantly disadvantaged in one way or another and that the direction of travel of the country was only making matters worse for an increasing number of its citizens. Our healthcare systems were beginning to crumble at the centre; public transport in rural areas particularly was almost none existent; food banks were popping up in every town around the country, and many communities were under pressure to sustain their prized levels of interdependence.

On our drive home that night Moira and I continued the conversation and we began to throw around a few ideas about what we personally could do to make a small dent for the better in our own community, if anything?

After a while the idea of a village lunch club came into our heads. It seemed to have many of the facets we were looking for. We could invite anybody who lived in the two villages; it could appeal to young and the not so young; it was not gender, wealth or politically biased and it might simply bring people together within a genuine community event. It also appeared to be something we felt we could lend our hands to.

That was the beginning – we took a decision. We came home and we made an arrangement to visit Karen, the vicar, to get an insight as to the "make up" of the village. We spoke to a number of friends and acquaintances and we researched the possibility of perhaps forming a Community Lunch Club.

Eventually we decided to give it a go and we set a number of 15 as the success bar for the initial number of guests.

We press-ganged Pauline into helping us, (we knew nothing of the workings of the Village Hall then, and even now we are still searching for the dish washer), and we opened our doors on that fateful Tuesday some 6 or 7 years ago, (we loose count). The rest you know about. We continued to provide a Community Lunch every 6 – 8 weeks, (with the exception of the covid "lock-down" year of 2020), for never less than 32 villagers, a few events in excess of 50, and averaging more than 40+ over the years. We even managed a D Day centenary celebration lunch with more than 70 in attendance. Throughout that time, we have been lucky to have had the support of Pauline, Annika, Lexi and Dan and others, with fabulous flower arrangements on numerous occasions by Elizabeth and Diane; with table and chair disassembly's and removals by Charlie, along with countless other willing conscripts/contributors.

That is the journey then that has taken us to Tuesday 18th April 2023

We arrived on that day and did what we have always done. Having spent the previous week planning the menu – testing it on ourselves one evening for supper; getting out the emails and telephone calls; sifting the replies; shopping on Sunday; prepping and cooking all day Monday; then cooking and serving and washing up on Tuesday. On this occasion to more than 40 villagers.

But this time, it was not quite the same. This time Moira delivered a different end of lunch announcement - this time would be the last time that we would present a Community Lunch. She spoke the announcement quietly, modestly, briefly and with genuine sadness. I tried to add a few words but failed miserably because I too realised how much this modest event had come to mean to us, what a lovely group of people we have been living amongst all these years and how lucky we are to share in such a community. Thanks to all who came along over the years and thanks to our terrific "backing group." It has been the best of times.

THE PLATINUM GARDEN PROJECT UPDATE

It's two months since I last shared an update on the Platinum Garden Project and since then you will have seen some progress.

- > The huge tree stump in the middle of the proposed lawn, has been ground down sufficiently to turf over it.
- > The concrete path to the allotments has been extended and widened (and great it looks too!).
- > The beds around the path have been edged in sleepers and are ready to be dug over, soiled up and planted.
- Our application for a National Garden Scheme Grant was rejected they were inundated with applications.

So far, Andy Hoad and Kevin Robbins have supported all the manual effort with services bought in to remove the stump and lay the concrete. Thanks to them both and in particular to Andy who has been investing HUGE amounts of time and effort to get us to where we are. In preparing the path, he kept finding manhole covers which needed to be repaired and worked around. Looks so different now!

What's next? If Andy is happy to carry on digging (which he assures me he is!) then he will continue to dig out the ground for the hoggin picnic area – no small task! We have enough funds left for the hardcore and hoggin and St Filica members have kindly donated some funds which will buy us a bench. We will need volunteers (muscle required!) to help shift the hardcore and hoggin when the time is right.

We continue to look for other grant and funding options to keep up progress. If you would like to donate towards plants or a metre of turf or a picnic bench, we are in the process of setting up a JustGiving page which we will share as soon as we can—we would be grateful for anything you can spare—it all helps.

E don't just put on shows in the village hall, we also hold regular monthly (usually last Friday) meetings, when we read plays (or whatever!), and chat and drink wine.



Wild Garlic Chicken Kiev

It's here again! Hurrah. It is so exciting to see the roadsides adorned with this wonderful wild garlic plant. I have several ways I use Wild Garlic.. in 2021 I gave the Quiche recipe, and indeed advised where to go to find the garlic*.. if in doubt, check with neighbours if they have any or just go out around Eastleach and Southrop and you will find! This recipe is another of my favourites. *Do make sure you know what you are looking for and don't pick anything inedible. A good test is the smell!

Ingredients (serves 4)

4 skinless chicken breasts
100g wild garlic butter (see below)
50g plain flour, seasoned
3 large eggs, beaten
125g panko breadcrumbs or coarse dried breadcrumbs
Handful of wild garlic leaves.
Oil for frying



Wild Garlic Butter. (Freeze any left and cut off slices as you need them to enhance other food!)
250g unsalted butter.
50g wild garlic leaves finely chopped.

To make butter, soften butter slightly, mash in a bowl with a little sea salt. Stir in the wild garlic. Using a piece of baking parchment, roll into a log shape. Twist ends of parchment to form a cracker and chill until needed

Kiev Method

Slice a deep pocket into each chicken breast (insert a sharp knife into the side of the fillet and slice along but don't cut right through or to each end). If the fillet is very thick, flatten it slightly (cover with cling film and give it a light bash all over with a rolling pin). Fill the cavity of each fillet with 25g of the wild garlic butter, pushing the butter in as far as possible. Add a couple of extra leaves for more flavour).

Use 3 shallow bowls, fill 1 with the beaten eggs, 1 with breadcrumbs and 1 with flour. Dredge each fillet through the flour, then the egg, then lastly the breadcrumbs. Dip again into the egg, and again into the breadcrumb to get a good covering. Place on plate and chill for 1 hr.

When ready to cook/eat, heat oven to 180C/160 Fan/Gas 4. Fill a pan 2cm deep with oil. When oil is at a medium heat, fry the Kiev's for 2-3 minutes on each side till golden then transfer to a hot baking tray and pop in oven for 15 minutes or until cooked through. Try to position the Kiev's when cooking with the open side facing up as much as possible to stop the butter all oozing out.
