Summary of Parish Council Meeting 12 July 2023

- Platinum Garden is progressing they now have a just giving page please see website and newsletter for details
- Taylors Close Kickabout field awaiting Matt Simpson to replace the fence then the surface will be ploughed and reseeded. PLEASE NOTE THE FIELD WILL BE CLOSED DURING THE WINTER
- **ROAD CLOSURE** Rouses Lane 14-18 August 24 hrs a day. We are trying to get more details of this and will inform everyone affected.
- Some progress has been made with SSE on the re-connection of the phone box and we are hoping refurbishment can take place soon to allow installation of a defibrillator.
- If your child uses the school bus and although there are spare seats they have been denied travel there is an appeal system in place. Please contact the Clerk for more details
- If you have any queries or want to ask the Council a question please contact the Clerk Cris Hoad clerk@filkins.org.uk 01367 860388
- We can understand that items of concern are discussed with friends whilst out walking or in the
 pub. But please, if you have any please do contact the Parish Council, if we are not made aware of
 them, we cannot deal with them appropriately.

VILLAGE MATTERS

- **PLEASE** pick up your **dog poo** and put the bag in one of the three bins provided. It is being left on the grass or the bags are being dumped. The worst places are Bulls Close, footpath past CWW and Rouses Lane. Our Groundsman should not have to work around dog poo! Please be responsible.
- **BULLS CLOSE** we realise the white lines are faded but please park within them we will try and get them re-painted but parking is scarce in this area and if one car takes 2 spaces it means a resident can't park safely.
- **OVERHANGING BRANCHES** if you have trees or bushes that overhang the footpath please cut them back so that the footpath is clear and to a height of over 61/2 feet
- **GREEN ENERGY**. The electricity contract for the village centre was up for renewal. We have switched to 100% green energy, saving a significant amount off our bill at the same time as helping to tackle climate change.
- TRAFFIC Road safety is an ongoing focus, including the volume of traffic, noise, bad driving and speed and we continue to work with OCC Highways this includes ALL roads in Filkins & Broughton Poggs. There are several options all of which have their pros and cons, including likely effectiveness, unintended consequences and cost. These include exploring approaches to gather more data to understand the extent of the issues. To date the Parish Council has had little official feedback from residents with only one question raised at the recent APM which was answered. We understand from the newsletter and CLP website that a group of residents are endeavouring to raise funds to purchase equipment and the necessary training to carry out speed checks (we assume) on the B4477 to deter speeding. Would this alone be sufficient.
- Options to limit speed include speed humps (though these are expensive and have to be funded by us), natural deterrents (such as the flashing speed sign at the entrance to the village on the B4477), and also a 20mph limit.

Below is a map of the area a 20mph limit would extend if this was applied for (thicker line is 20mph limit). Speeds are naturally kept below 20 mph within most of this area by parked cars and the natural and built-up geography of the area. The B4477 would not be covered from the entrance to the village to Montpellier then from Broughton Poggs turn to A361- this is because it is a predominantly open and rural area. The area covered is the decision of OCC Highways not the Parish Council and will not be extended. If we apply it will not be implemented until 2025.

- The village would have to accept between 10-15 new 20mph signs along its length. Large signs at the entrance and exit to the limit and smaller repeater signs within the area. Studies are showing that the average speed in a 20mph zone only drop by 4mph so 30 may become 26 40mph 36.
- How much benefit will there be —it is not possible to define how much benefit would be gained, some areas have benefitted, others have seen division, frustration, increased pollution and higher accident rates. Some areas that have applied for and have been granted 20mph zones are now actively campaigning to have them removed and revert back to 30mph

 Does the geography of much of the village (in the areas that would be 20mph) negate the need for a limit?

So the questions the Council have to ask is –

 What are the main concerns re traffic in terms of areas, speed v volume v bad driving etc? What are your views on the best ways to improve road safety. AS YOU LIKE IT by William Shakespeare 1st July 2023

On a balmy July evening we relaxed out of doors in the Forest of Filkins - surely an offshoot of the Forest of Arden – glass of wine in hand, picnic at the ready. Ahead lay the Filkins Theatre Group's performance of As You Like It and we were ready to brush up our Shakespeare or to get acquainted with one of the Bard's popular comedies, and enjoy ourselves.

Which we did!

With insight and ingenuity Jeremy Irwin-Singer's

accomplished direction ensured a lively performance, capturing the contrasting themes of court and countryside, laced with intrigue and love entanglements. The paddock setting served well for the court scenes and the forest, with plenty of space for movement. Rehearsed and confident characters used the space to good effect, around, and under, a perfect Greenwood Tree. The



audience relished the enthusiastic wrestling match between the court



muscle man Charles (Ian Grey) and his noble opponent, hero and romantic Orlando (Paul Floyd). There was exuberant song and dance too, thanks to musical direction from Heather Atkins and sound and lighting by Andy Hoad.

The breezy conditions were challenging at times but the cast delivered with

strength and clarity, capturing the blank verse well. There was memorable cynicism from Touchstone (Jeremy again) and a fine delivery of The Seven Ages of Man from Melancholy Jaques (Teresa Smallbone).



Several cast members successfully carried more than

one role. Lynne Savege was a heartlessly autocratic Duchess Frederica who then changed her dress and persona to be the wronged Duchess Senior. Costumes certainly added to the production, thanks to Jane

Martin's creation and organisation. The troupe of foresters (Trevor Milne-Day, Charlie Payne, Netty Lings, Monica Tudor and Julia Neame) sported great hippy style outfits and drew much laughter and admiration for their characterisation and exuberance. Where did they find that wig?!

Love in many forms abounds in this play. We saw and heard the anguish of Silvius (Charlie Payne) in his yearnings for the fickle Phoebe (Netty Lings). With devices of cross-dressing and some more lovesick behaviour from Orlando, we observed fair Rosalind (Sue Ashforth-Smith) instruct her unknowing admirer in the art of love. In the end, of course, love conquered all, at least for the duration of the play and the rousing finale brought reconciliation and happiness to the Forest of Filkins.

'HERE is a terrible sadness in the death of a man at 35, especially in a small village like ours. And even more when that death is of a gentle Good Man like Steven, who until lately tended to smile serenely at adversity, and keep going at his own calm pace.

When Steven went to secondary school, he would get off the bus opposite my office and often come in for a chat. Even then, he had the wistfulness of a fellow who knows that what he would like and what he might endeavour to find are not always the same.

Once he came and excitedly told me about a new schoolfriend. "I really, really like him" said Steven, and paused, considered, and added: "mind you, he doesn't like me at all." That might floor another fellow, but not Steven.

We would defy anyone not to have liked Steven, not to have to have been pleased to talk to him. Not least because he always strove to be so sunnily helpful whenever he was able.

In more recent years, Steven had branched out with a job he enjoyed at Asda, membership of the PCC, reading at the Carol year's pantomime, and helping at the village hall.

He loved to be part of things, and with reassurance, he could tackle most of them... and was, not least, a very good and expressive reader. The recent withering of

wanted the very best for him, not his spirit brought great despair to his family and many friends.

CHEATS PIZZA

This is a very simple weekday supper and can be served with any number of toppings, either hot or cold...can also be part of a picnic or served as canapes.



Ingredients:

- 1 Sheet of 'ready rolled' puff pastry.
- 1 egg yolk.
- 100g soft goats cheese.
- 4 x big juicy tomatoes cut into ½ cm slices.
- Dried oregano.
- Small handful of caperberries.

Heat oven to 200 degrees (180 fan/Gas 6) and place a large baking tray in to heat.

Allow your puff pastry to come up to room temperature (if you have stored it in the fridge).

Unroll the pastry onto the baking tray leaving it on its baking paper (you may need to trim it down at the sides to fit the baking tray).

Score the pastry about 1cm from the edge on all four sides, making sure not to cut right through.

Spread the goats cheese thinly over the pastry inside the scored edge, then cover with the sliced tomatoes, without overlapping them. Sprinkle over the oregano and caperberries and season with salt and pepper.

Brush the scored edges of the base with the egg yolk then place in the oven for 30 minutes. When cooked through and nicely coloured remove from the oven and place on a wire tray to cool. There is no need to remove the baking paper until you are ready to serve. Cut into slices with a pizza cutter.

Additional toppings:

- Diced red or green chillies.
- Anchovies in oil, drained.

Canapes

As an alternative you can use small cherry tomatoes sliced in half and placed in neat rows. Once cooked use the pizza cutter to slice up into small squares.
