#### **Tips for October**

Start to clear the beds once harvested, they are best covered with mulch, compost or leaf mould or some form of sheeting to protect the soil structure and help it retain its nutrients. Its natural state is to grow so if left will soon be covered in weeds.

Sow broad beans, garlic and winter lettuce and overwinter shallots and onions.

#### An Emergency Plan for Filkins and Broughton Poggs

The Annual Parish Meeting in May included a short presentation from Carol Mackay of Oxford-shire County Council on Emergency planning. The initial reaction of the Parish Council was that we could perhaps do more in terms of planning at a local level, and this was reinforced a few weeks later when a gas leak brought about the evacuation of BP residents from their houses. Whilst, thankfully, occurrences such as this and the floods of 2007 are extremely rare, it doesn't appear to be a huge amount of work to put in place some very basic arrangements to cater for anything that crops up in the future.

Rather than focus or imagining 'what might happen', the Emergency Plan will initially concentrate on providing a safe location that people could relocate to, should they need or wish (noting that in many situations staying at home is the safest thing to do). Early conversations have drawn us to both the Village Hall and Filkins Parish Church as buildings that could be used as a place of safety in future, with WODC offering grants for resilience items ranging from generators to crockery and colouring books for children.

At this stage the PC just want to bring your attention to this work, with more to follow in the next newsletter. In the interim, any suggestions or ideas will be gratefully received.

In parallel, we will be supporting a Lions initiative called, 'The **Lions Message in a Bottle** scheme', which is a simple idea designed to encourage people to keep personal and medical details on a standard form and in a common location - the fridge. Whilst it is focused on the more vulnerable people in our community, anyone can have an accident at home, so this scheme can benefit anyone. More details will follow next month.

#### Dear Residents, re: The Community Led Plan

We are now heading towards the completion of the consultation on our Community Led Plan. I say 'our plan' because it belongs to all of us... And that includes you!

As part of the Plan Committee, I have been tasked with hearing your views about planning, building, etc. in short, 'The Built Environment'. but not too many views have been put forward. I find this quite surprising, given the possbility of development up on Burford Road, or even in the centre of the village. Many local villages are earmarked for development and Filkins would not be exempt, which is why we need to address planning in our CPL.

Some say it won't happen, because there isn't enough infrastructure, ie mains sewage. Perhaps I could put it out there that a small development of say 6-12 modern houses operating on a clear water system is far more sustainable, and therefore possible, than a development even a few years ago with sewage going into a mains system already overloaded, spewing into our rivers and the sea. It is also now far more sustainable to build new houses, insulated and with heat pumps, bigger radiators and solar panels than trying to convert old buildings that can never meet the evolving targets.

This leads me onto water run-off. While you could put in an argument for water harvesting etc. undoubtedly some will end up in the stream, adding to the risk of flood water reaching parts of Filkins and Broughton Poggs. So due consideration should be given to these sorts of issues! This is not to say developments shouldn't go ahead, but we should make sure these sorts of issues are thought through properly beforehand and dealt with, by putting this into the plan we stand a better chance of having it addressed.

This is your chance to put these types of concerns forward. It's true, it may have no effect whatsoever on future plans whenever they arise but if you say nothing, then it definitely won't! Previous committees have worked hard to come forward with a Plan and have been unable to achieve one. It would be good to come forward with one now that the community has participated in fully – and that includes you!



#### A cocktail is not just for Summer!

As summer 2023 creeps off stage right after a very disappointing performance I would like to share with you a drink that brought a little sunshine into my summer this year – Aperol. No I don't ski; I don't frequent the 'Sloaney Pony' in Parsons Green and the only 'Summer House' we have is at the end of our garden....

FYI Aperol is an Italian bitter apéritif made of gentian, rhubarb and cinchona, among other ingredients. It has a vibrant red hue. Its name comes from Apero, a French slang word for apéritif. Aperol was originally created in 1919 by Luigi and Silvio Barbieri after seven years of experimentation. It did not become widely popular until after World War II.

Below are two Aperol recipes (if you can call them that) the first is the best traditional Aperol Spritz and the second is the extraordinary Strawberry Aperol Frozé.

#### Traditional Aperol Spritz

The secret to making an exceptional Aperol Spritz is in the mix ratio, one, two, three:

- One measure of Soda Water
- Two measures of Aperol
- Three measure of Prosecco

#### Methodology

Fill a large glass (Red wine glasses work well) with ice, pour in the Aperol, then add a generous slice of orange, add the Prosecco, followed by the Soda Water and finally squeeze in the juice of half a lime. Stir well and serve with a straw.

Mixologist's Tip: Use a sprit measuring cup (Jigger) to ensure the correct ratios, 25ml if you have work the next day, 50ml if you don't!

#### Strawberry Aperol Frozé (Serves 6)

This cocktail is a belter and guaranteed to impress! You will need the following ingredients:

- 200g strawberries, chopped.
- 50g caster sugar
- ½ bottle Rosé wine.
- 100ml Aperol.

#### Methodology

Mix the strawberries and sugar together, then whizz in a

liquidiser or a hand blender until completely smooth. Strain through a sieve into a large, freezer proof container. Stir in the wine and Aperol, then cover and freeze overnight/until solid.

Once frozen break the mixture up with a serving spoon and liquidise again in 2-3 batches to create a thick, smooth mixture with evenly sized crystals. If it's too solid, leave out of the fridge for 10-15 minutes first, then pour into 6 glasses and serve.

Mixologist's Tip: Serve with a small 'pretty' strawberry and a leaf of mint and drink a toast to Luigi and Silvio....


