# Filkins Drift Friday 17th November

The village hall was packed for an evening of music, food and wine brought to us by he Village Hall committee, and what an evening! The duo, Seth on fiddle and Chris on guitar, called themselves Filkins Drift, as they had discovered and practiced in the derelict control tower on the old airfield (illegally of course but it had a great acoustic). Their existence had also been discovered by a chance meeting between their parents and Richard Martin at a local dinner and one thing led to another, to bring them to perform for us.

They had recently returned from an 870 mile sustainable walk around the Welsh coast playing gigs almost every night of their journey, after walking around 15 miles a day. They kept us entertained with snippets from their adventure, which raised over £4000 for the charity Live Music Now, and with tunes and songs traditional and self composed. Their energy was infectious and many toes were tapping. The stories they recounted amused and fascinated, from arriving just in time for one gig having scrambled up a bank to arguments over the varying local names of tunes, to an encounter in Dartington where, recognizing the name of Filkins, they were told that many tunes and dances originating in this village had been rediscovered by the Dartington morris side many years ago and they now only danced 'Filkins morris'.

Interestingly as we were able to tell the boys, the Dartington side had contacted the Swinford Museum and were then invited to come here and dance at 'Filkins Exposed!' in 2016 and various 'Filkins Feasts'.

Between sets, a supper of chilli con carne followed by apple crumble and custard was enjoyed by all with wine and a re-labelled Filkins Drift Beer. The décor and ambience in the hall was super, a great event, thank you to Richard and his team of cooks and bartenders.



# Witney Food Bank



When I was a child, my siblings and I, (there were 5 of us), were treated to a number of annual staples. It would begin with Whitsuntide when we were all allowed to choose a new outfit which we would wear at the Whit Sunday Church Walk; June would see us at the Travelling Fair when we could stay out until it was dark and spend 2 shillings each without too much adult control;

August brought Dad's club trip to the coast along with the gift of an apple, an orange and a half crown to spend as we wished; Bonfire Night was magic, with fireworks, street food, and a book which Dad traditionally bought each of us; and then finally there was Christmas when the 5 children would queue in age order up the bedroom steps waiting to be called to come down to open our presents, neatly arranged in separate piles around the lounge.

We never questioned whether these events would take place, we just knew that they would. Cost was never a consideration to us children, although with hindsight it perhaps should have been, and any fiscal sacrifices that may have been made by our parents throughout the year were invisible to us.

So - how far have we travelled since the days of the 1950's? and in which direction? I think I will leave that question hanging.

One fact however, remains. The need for Food Banks to assist with the feeding of children, families, the elderly and other disadvantaged groups and individuals does not decline. It continues to grow ever more rapidly. The people who organise the Witney Food Bank operation are genuinely grateful for the contributions that the residents of Broughton Poggs and Filkins have made throughout the year, as no doubt, are those people who are driven to use their services. So, as Christmas approaches, we thought it appropriate that we let everyone know that we do maintain our monthly trips to Witney with all contributions dropped in the box at the village shop along with food items bought with the generous contributions made by numerous members of our community.

The next delivery of collected items will be made in December to coincide with the approach of Christmas and if anyone would want to make a donation, then it would make a difference.

#### **REMEMBRANCE DAY**

As in previous years wreaths were laid at our two memorials, starting at 10.30am in the churchyard in Broughton Poggs. The group then moved on to join others gathered at the crossroads in Filkins for the Reverend Margot Hodson to conduct the wreath laying at 11am. The two minutes silence was broken by the sound of the bugle and the familiar words "we will remember them".

The service, which continued in Filkins Church, emphasised the sacrifice of many and especially of the men from the parish who died in the two World Wars and the sombre mood served to underline the impact of contemporary confrontations in different parts of the world.

churches to mark Remembrance was

Gray for such thoughtful and beautiful
tributes, to John Allison and Ian
Cutmore for laying the wreaths, and to

for the specially decorated boards
which they placed at the Filkins
memorial alongside the poppy wreath.





Continuing our occasional travel series, Jennifer Rooke shares her recent adventure in Uzbekistan & I am sorry the b&w photos don't do them justice. Ed.

#### **Uzbekistan**

When I told friends I was going to spend my holiday travelling around Uzbekistan, more often than not the response was ... why there? Followed by ... where is it? Why not? I would reply. I know nothing about this country or even that part of the world, let alone it's history. I knew about the Silk Road and such places as Samarkand, Bukhara and Khiva from earlier travels in the Middle East but when I discovered that all these places are in Uzbekistan I was hooked. A photo of an amazing mosque with a beautiful turquoise tiled dome confirmed it. That's where I was going on my next holiday! I Immediately booked myself on to an organised group tour (16 of us) with the adventure company Exodus.

#### Where is Uzbekistan?

It is located in the heart of Central Asia. It is one of the five "stans" (stans meaning land of) - Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Turkmenistan. Put simply, Uzbekistan is east of the Middle East, south of Russia, west of China and north of Afghanistan and India. Uzbekistan is the equivalent in area to Spain or California and is almost landlocked except for a 150km coastline on the Aral Sea. There are just over 33 million people living there, with 90% of the population Islamic, the remainder Russian Orthodox. The official languages are Uzbek, Russian and Tajik. Some speak English especially the school children who love to practice with you!


#### Bit of Uzbekistan History


What a history! Very briefly .....stone age man was there as far back as 100,000 years. More recently you may have heard of Cyrus the Great (king of Persia), Alexander the Great, Genghis Khan and the Mongols and Amir Timur. All of whom at one time or another invaded and ruled the country. Much later on it was the turn of Tsarist Russia, the Bolsheviks and USSR. At the break-up of the Soviet Union, Uzbekistan gained its I dependence in December 1991.

A lot of what I saw reflected these times and people – in the mosques and mausoleums but also in their pottery, food and textiles. Yes, they do grow a lot of silk and cotton, mostly exported but they also use it in their carpets and embroideries. The country is rich in minerals notably gold, copper and uranium. It also has natural gas.

#### Where did I go?

We flew into the capital Tashkent, where we met up with our tour leader Babhur, then an internal flight to Nukus in the north to visit Khiva, drove by bus south by the Turkmenistan border to Bhukara, took a left into the Kyzylkum Desert to experience the Kazakh country before heading south to Samarkand. From Samarkand we took the "Bullet" train (getting up to over 200km per hour) back to Tashkent for one more night before catching our flight back to UK. A whirlwind tour!







#### What's there to see?

Loads! Masses of mosques, minarets, madrasases (Islamic schools) and mausoleums along with covered markets. All built in various centuries (9th century onwards), all decorated differently using those vivid turquoise glazed tiles I first saw in that photo. All restored in some way or other. They are all extremely tall, imposing but exquisitely decorated buildings – inside and out. Externally they are predominantly tiled in turquoise and blue, internally more colourful but both heavily patterned. The mausoleums inside are often decorated in gold! Simply impressive. By the way, the turquoise colour of the tiles comes from the copper that's found in the desert sand. We also visited fortresses, palaces and museums including an impressive textile museum and one devoted to avant garde Russian art.



#### Food and Drink - good?

Yes to both. Uzbek food is dominated by mutton, noodles and bread although I also ate beef and chicken, usually grilled as kebabs but they also produced some lovely meaty soups & stews. There were salads and fruit to eat too. I also tried the national dish "plov"-a rice based dish with vegetables and pieces of meat. Red wine was good, so too the local beer. For lunch it was usually green tea sometimes fresh mint tea.

#### People friendly?

Again yes. The people I came in contact with were warm and friendly even if we couldn't speak the same language! At no time did I feel unsafe even walking around the cities at 11 o'clock at night. We just tended to mingle with the crowds as many locals were also visiting the tourist spots or eating at the same restaurants. Everyone seemed to have mobile phones and wifi was available in all our hotels, which were comfortable and modern. They all seem to drive modern cars, either white or black, some in other colours but they tended to be older Russian Ladas.

#### So what of these Silk Road cities?

**Khiva -** a definite favourite for me. The perfectly restored old city is a UNESCO World Heritage Site, it is a living museum basically and so easy and enjoyable to walk around, day and night and just full of those turquoise tiled domes and minarets In 1997 it celebrated it's 2500th birthday!

**Bukhara -** now a modern working city. We stayed in the old part, touring around more of those beautiful mosques & minarets, in particular the Kalyan minaret, known as the death tower (women were forced to jump off from the top) but also the famous "Fortress Ark" - a medieval mud-brick citadel with a grisly history. Babhur, our tour leader, told us this was the best place to go shopping for silk (obviously) and cotton embroidery work and anything else that caught our fancy. He taught us how to barter the Uzbek way. **Samarkand -** the jewel of the ancient (and modern) Silk Road with the spectacular Registan Square, the site of three exquisite madrasses, domes etc each built in a different century although you wouldn't know it. Again each beautifully tiled. The light show, with music, at night was a wonder in itself. Much of the buildings in Samarkand are connected with Amir Timur (C14th invader now a national hero), indeed inside his mausoleum it is incredibly heavily decorated in gold - 5kgs of it. Mind blowingly beautiful.

Of course I saw lots more, such as the desert fortresses of ancient Khorezm and the sights of Tashkent including the Chorsu Bazaar where I bought some Silk Road spices but I will stop now. In short, my trip around Uzbekistan far exceeded what little expectations I had. Would I recommend people visit - definitely.

#### Where next you ask?

I would like to visit another stan, possibly Kazakhstan – the largest of the 'stans'.


#### Parish Council Meeting – November meeting

#### **OTHER ITEMS**

Bus Service 64 - As many of you know, OCC are utilising a proportion of their BSIP+ funding allocation from Government to partially reinstate bus service 64 between Witney, Carterton, Lechlade, Highworth and Swindon. It also partially replaces service H2S between Witney, Minster Lovell and Burford School.

Timetable, effective from 27<sup>th</sup> November 2023. The £2 national fare cap scheme will apply to this service and both Stagecoach and Pulhams paper tickets are valid on common sections of route with service 233 between Burford, Carterton and Witney. Stagecoach and Swindon Bus Company paper tickets are also valid on common sections of route between Highworth and Swindon.



Funding is in place for 18 months currently. When Lee Bennett undertook the survey over 80% of replies said they would use this service, if it is not utilised we will lose it again when the route goes to tender.....

#### TIRAMISU:

# A 'Boozy' Pudding for Christmas

This is recipe is taken from the very first Cook Book I ever purchased called 'Essential Italian Cookery,' I am informed by the current Mrs Law that there is an abundance of Tiramisu recipes available, however this one is very easy, and the results are (almost) guaranteed for an ever so slightly 'Boozy' Christmas pud.

#### Ingredients:

- 2 egg yolks
- 2 tbsp caster sugar.
- ½ tsp vanilla essence
- 250g mascarpone cheese
- 250ml strong black coffee
- 2 tsp Marsala
- 1 tbsp Brandy
- 150g sponge fingers
- 1 tbsp cocoa powder
- 2 tbsp grated dark chocolate

#### Method

Mix the egg yolks and sugar together in a bowl with a wooden spoon until they are creamy. Add the vanilla and fold in the mascarpone cheese. The mixture should be creamy.

Make the strong black coffee, when cool mix with the marsala and brandy in a flat bottomed bowl. Dip the sponge fingers into the coffee mixture. They should absorb just enough liquid to flavour them without going soggy and falling apart.

Arrange some of the soaked sponge fingers in the base of a large (attractive) glass bowl, then thinly cover with half of the mascarpone mix.

Add a second layer of sponge fingers and cover them with the remaining mascarpone mix. Sift the coca power over the top and sprinkle with the grated dark chocolate. Chill for 3 – 4 hours.

#### Cook's Tip:



- The flavour improves if the Tiramisu is left in the fridge overnight.
- I use a folk to cover the sponge fingers in the mascarpone mix.
- Applying cling film to the exposed edges of the glass bowl before sifting the cocoa powder over the top improves to look of the dish.

Tiramisu from the Italian tirami su, "pick me up" or "cheer me up" is a coffee-flavoured
