For most of us December is perhaps the quietest month of the year in the garden. Stringing up outdoor lights being the main reason for being outside. Of course that assumes you've finished all your autumn tasks. I am grateful for the mild start to the winter which allows me to carry on with unfinished tasks without feeling cold at all! Planting tulips in December - wouldn't have done that a few years ago. The later the better to try and avoid tulip fire: a fungal disease causing brown scorched looking spots and distorted withered leaves and flowers.

At the end of December into January we tend to focus on indoor plants. Unfortunately my cyclamens wilt as do my white flowered jasmines on a hoop. My poinsettias drop their leaves (actually bracts). I just can't keep them in the style in which they are mass marketed. This year however I have cyclamen coum, hyacinths, 'Paper White' narcissi and hellebores – all of which can have a second life in the garden. I'm trying to avoid the Christmas horticultural massacre!

Please send the committee your ideas for visits in 2026. We meet at the end of January to plan our programme but already have two visits booked. Our annual meeting, to which all members are warmly invited, is on

March 6th at 15.00 in the village hall.



SWINFORD MUSEUM

We hope you will all have/had a good Christmas and a Happy New Year. Work now starts on spring cleaning the museum ready to install the new exhibitions. I thought you may be interested in reading an excerpt from a book written in 1896 by William Monk, entitled 'Walks and Drives Around Burford'



Near the church is 'The Peacock Farm', so named because there are two yew trees in the garden which are trained in the shape of a peacock. The villagers tell a curious story in connection with the house. It is given here, but the author declines to be responsible for all the details. Years ago, this farm was hired by a Mr Jonas Bassett. His housekeeper was named Betty Hill and she used to declare that a lady, in the garb of other days, frequently passed through the house. For years the apparition came, till one day some children, by playing rather boisterously in the old house, caused an old stocking to fall down from a place where it had been hidden away. In this old stocking, the story continues, there was a knob of gold, which is said to have been of considerable value. It is satisfactory to be able to record that after this incident, nothing was ever afterwards seen of the unhappy lady who haunted the Peacock Farm House for so long.

It doesn't say what happened to the knob of gold but I hope the children benefitted from it. It would be good if the Peacocks could be reinstated.

The Parish Council held a meeting with OCC- LFP team, Highways, Drainage and Bridges, WODC and landowners re the steps we want to take for flood prevention. The meeting was very productive and a second will be held in the new year to progress proposals.

Further to the spate of burglaries in our villages 3 residents attended a meeting between TVP and the Community last week –we did invite them to attend our May Annual Parish Meeting but unfortunately they were called away just before the meeting started. However, it was raised that a Village WhatsApp group may be useful which any resident can set up. There is currently the village Facebook page – does anyone have any thoughts on this.

The Parish Council as Village Centre Trustees discussed the community shop, which has been a great success since it was founded 20 years ago and which the village centre rightly continued to support. 

Mary Berry Crackle Cheese Biscuits

We were recently served these delicious biscuits with drinks by a different Mary (but an equally great cook!) – they were so delicious they deserve to be shared!



Ingredients

100g plain flour
1/4 tsp salt
1/4 tsp paprika or cayenne pepper
100g butter, softened
100g mature cheddar cheese grated
25g Rice Krispies

Method

Preheat oven to 180 degrees C/160 fan/Gas 4. Line two baking sheets with non-stick/greaseproof paper. Put the butter, flour, salt and cheese into a food processor. Whiz until mixture comes together. Spoon into a bowl and add the Rice Krispies, mixing well with your hands to combine.

Shape the mixture into 30 small balls. Place on baking sheet and press down firmly with a fork.

Bake in the oven for 18-20 minutes until the edges are golden and crackers are firm. Let them cool on the sheet for about 5 minutes then move to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in airtight container for up to 5 days. Or of course, serve immediately as a savoury snack. Not suitable for freezing.
